# Intro to Agriculture

Agriculture, growing plants and raising animals, is important to New York State. About 23% of the state's land area, or 7 million acres of land, are used by the 36,300 farms to produce food products.

Milk is New York's leading agricultural product and ranks third in the United States for milk production.

New York ranks second in the nation for our

production of apples. Our leading varieties are McIntosh, Empire, Red Delicious and Golden Delicious.

Grapes for juice and wine place New York third in US production behind California and Washington State. The four major grape producing areas are near Lake Erie, the Finger Lakes, the Hudson

Valley and eastern Long Island.

In 2011, New York produced 564,000 gallons of maple syrup which ranked our state second in the nation behind Vermont.

Farmers in New York grow many other crops and raise birds and animals

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### **Basic Bee Facts**



A honeybee's body has three sections, a head, the middle section, called a thorax, and an abdomen.

The honeybee has six legs and four wings that come from the thorax and two antennae that come from their forehead.

A bee smells, tastes, and feels with its two antennae. It also senses things with the hairs on its body and legs.

A bee has five eyes: two large compound eyes on each side of its head and three smaller eyes on top of its head.

Bees use their long, tubelike tongues like straws (called proboscis) to suck the nectar out of the flowers and they store it in their stomachs and carry it to the beehive to make honey.

A beehive is built with wax produced in special glands in the workers' abdomens.



All worker bees are female. They build the beehive and perform all the jobs necessary for the survival of the hive.

A bee uses its stinger to defend itself. Only worker bees sting people or animals

Each beehive cell is a six-sided shape called a hexagon.

### **Honey Krispie Bars**

#### **Ingredients:**

3/4 cup Honey

3/4 cup peanut butter, chunky

3 1/2 cups Rice Krispies

1 tsp. vanilla

1 cup chocolate chips

1/2 cup butterscotch chips



Honey should not be fed to babies under one year of age. Honey is a safe and wholesome food for older children and adults.

**Instructions:** Bring Honey and peanut butter just to a boil. Add vanilla and cereal. Mix well. Pack into ungreased 9" x 13" pan. Melt chocolate chips and butterscotch chips together and spread over bars. Let cool and enjoy.


